## All The Time

#### There is a call and response liturgy that goes like this: God is good! All the time! All the time! God is good!

I love the way this litany does double duty: it both names our experience of daily life, and, strangely, helps shape our understanding of it *at the same time*. Phrases like these are simultaneously confession (naming truth about how our days are lived) and creed (claiming Truth about where our lives are centered).

As we begin the interim season together, I'd like to take a few weeks to think about the different kind of time this is. Hope is an amazing community. I am in awe of the variety of people, ministries, conversations, and dreams that inhabit this congregation. The work of searching for your next called pastor will be happening alongside a mountain of wonderful projects, programs, and passions.

Before we dive headlong into the fall schedule, let's spend August exploring **"All the Time"** that is part of an interim season, and how these different times will both shape and define us. Join me for a four-week sermon series about God's goodness across all these different kinds of time:

August 4	All the Time: Covenant Time
August 11	All the Time: Shadow Time
August 18	All the Time: Joining God Time
August 25	All the Time: Homecoming Time

## Children's Ministry – A Plea

For those who don't know me, I am Linnea Becerra. I got married here in the Hope courtyard on April 3, 2021 to my husband Cesar Becerra. The next year we welcomed our first daughter, Mira Becerra, to the world and a year and a half later welcomed our second daughter, Lucella Becerra. Both of our daughters were baptized here at Hope and now spend every Sunday running around the sanctuary, splashing in the baptismal font, eagerly partaking in communion, coloring and playing in the children's area and singing along with the choir. I have loved every minute of watching my daughters grow at Hope.

I could write an essay on what Hope means to me, my husband and daughters, my parents who married and grew a family here, and my grandparents who met here in the Hope choir. I will not do that though and will get straight to the point.

#### The children's ministry team needs help.

I want nothing more than to carry on the tradition of raising my kids here at Hope but to put it bluntly- I will not continue if I must do it alone. In the last few years the children's ministry team had long time members step down and those shoes have not been filled. Our current team is made up of four members, all of whom have kids in children and youth programming.

## **Reimagining the University Lutheran Church of Hope Women's Retreat**

#### Save the date: Friday Evening - Saturday Night, January 24-25, 2025

The retreat will be held at one of our favorite places to explore and build community ULCH! Please read on about significant changes for next year.

**Review:** After the wonderful January 2024 Women's Retreat, the hope was that there would be a way to continue, in spite of the cost challenges for participants and general retreat funding. The reality, after looking at the final costs, is that with deficits for two years in a row, we cannot continue without some significant changes.

**Discernment - What's Next?** We explored the possibility of sharing the retreat center space with another group in order to bring down costs. This year's participants were supportive of this option. After reaching out to four churches, though appreciative of being contacted, none of them could make a commitment. That meant needing to pivot and shift our thinking. What could a retreat for 2025 look like if not held at Dunrovin Retreat Center?

Ann and Beáta met with pastors Jen and Maria and discussed ways to **Reimagine** the retreat. While the "getaway" factor of a retreat center is desirable, we know that for many, the rising cost has become a challenge. Available scholarship money cannot support making up the difference, as more and more financial assistance has been requested. From feedback we've received, we know that other roadblocks to attending include: time commitment, distance, physical limitations and sleep challenges.

**A Solution:** We are thinking positively about **Reimagining** a retreat held on our home turf at ULCH, with some twists, yet to be determined. The key pluses in having an "in house" retreat are:

- Community building
- Minimal cost
- Flexibility and accessibility for a wider range of people

Saturday morning will still be focused on a spiritual theme. The afternoon and evening might include time for additional theme-related discussions, quiet reflection, massages, crafting and dinner. There is an endless list of possibilities!

**Friday Night Option** - If Friday night is included, it will be purely a community builder with no set agenda. Time for dinner, fun, games, marshmallow roasting, or a movie. Participants can return home for a good night's sleep! **Planning Ahead** - If you are interested in helping us plan for this new format, we'd love to hear from you! We will be reaching out again in the Fall, but please let us know at any time if you have ideas or would like to be part of the "**Reimagining**" planning.


## **Bible and Brews**



## **CIRCULATION DAY EVENT**

Do you have items that are in great condition that you no longer use? It's time to get them back into circulation! **Circulation Day** is an idea groups are trying that keep items out of landfills and get them to anyone who can use them. This year at the Neighborhood Hope Party on September 15th, our congregation will be giving it a try!

**How does it work?** Starting about a week before, you can bring items to the church where we'll hold them. After the service, all items will be set out on tables in the parking lot and be available for the taking. Leftover items will be brought to charitable thrift shops. Start gathering stuff now!

What can we bring? We're giving this idea a try by starting out relatively small. We will be collecting household items (kitchen, decor, small appliances, etc.), arts or crafts materials, tools, garden supplies, and office supplies.

What CAN'T we bring? Pretty much anything not listed above, especially no clothing, furniture, books, and any particularly large items. We want to be able to easily transport leftovers after the event. Also, be sure items are clean, in good repair, and not missing any parts.

**Who can take items?** ANYONE! If you see something you want or need, just take it and get it back into circulation. Don't be shy about grabbing something you can use. If you see something that you think a family member or friend would like, feel free to take it for them as well. We'll be advertising the event through Lutheran Campus Ministry and around the Dinkytown neighborhood, but if you know anyone else who'd like to take a look around, invite them to stop by.

Are there ways that we can help other than donating items? Since Circulation Day is not a fundraiser, there is no need for pricing items, collecting money, or safeguarding against theft since everything is free! We will, however, need some help putting out the items, keeping things organized, and bringing leftover items to various thrift stores afterwards. ### President's Report: In the Season of Deep Listening

The Donation Discernment journey is transitioning into implementation! The initial projects are grounded in our Affirmation of Welcome, "University of Lutheran Church of Hope, believing that the gospel is God's gift to all people, seeks to be a welcoming community.... To the stranger we offer hospitality. To all, we extend a most heartfelt welcome and wish them continued peace in the Lord."

The Board heard loud and clear the wish to remodel the kitchenette and its adjacent hospitality spaces, approving projects which will be funded by a generous contribution from the donation and a portion of capital campaign funds. The Hospitality Spaces Exploration Group has envisioned the creation of "a functional, user friendly, energy efficient, visually appealing kitchenette that can better support our hospitality ministry to the congregation, visitors, students, other neighbors, and the larger community". The remodeling project will add four feet of counter space and 7.5 square feet of floor space, by reconfiguring the kitchenette's common wall with the library. New cabinetry will be installed in the library. Plans include installation of an electric radiant cooktop (replacing the gas range), a microwave, new refrigerator/freezer, new cabinets and countertop, a larger sink, and a new dishwasher. As I write this, I am imagining your big smile and enthusiastic "yes"!

A second, all-gender, ADA-compliant bathroom will be created to serve the heavily used, Eastside of the building. A custodial closet addition, also on the Eastside of the building, will provide a sink and cleaning supply storage. Work will begin in early September, continuing into October and November. There will be disruption and dislocation, and **this is where you come in** – volunteers will be needed to empty and transport the contents of the kitchenette and library to their temporary, relocation sites.

Refurnishing the lounge and Eastside hallway will provide comfortable and durable seating and ease in adjusting furniture to accommodate differing groups and activities, in an aesthetically cohesive, harmonious, inviting space. The lounge and hallway can continue to be used during the kitchenette remodeling.

These enhanced hospitality spaces will accommodate new programming planned by the Wellness Exploration Group, for the "people who live, work, and worship in our neighborhood [to] experience community, safety, healing, and support for their whole wellbeing" and the events envisioned by the Themed Programming Exploration Group, to be jointly developed by Hope ministry groups and community organizations.

Why are we doing all of this? Diana Butler Bass, author of *Christianity for the Rest of Us,* claims hospitality "...is a central practice of the Christian faith. Christians welcome [all] as we ourselves have been welcomed into God through the love of Jesus Christ. Through hospitality, Christians imitate God's welcome."

Last month I reported that our General Giving was below by \$14.6K. With Nathan's assistance I was able to determine that there were no significiate changes to pledges nor had any pledges been cancelled. While the amount was under buget by \$14K, the amount received was actual \$200 less than the average giving for the previous 4 months.

This month our General Giving is inline with our budgeted amount and is still inline with the previous month's averages.

In summary - our General Giving is still strong, our rental income is even stronger. Currently our Total Income is better than budget by \$25.5K.

Salary & Benefits is slightly over budget due to an overlap between Pastor Jen and Pastor Susan. I'm expecting to see July's Salary & Benefits also be slightly over budget due to same overlap. Due to timing, our Total Expenses are over budget YTD by \$3.3K. We have already paid for items that are budgeted in 2024 but for later in year. This is a normal occurrence. I'm still expecting July's expenses to be over budget due to an over lap between Pastor Jen and Pastor Susan and additional expenses for Pastor Jen's Going Away Party. However due to the generousity of everyone we will be able to absorb these additional expenses.

Our Building Fund has a value as of \$214K as of 6.30.2024. Our new front doors should be installed by the end of the summer. We have paid 50% of the expense of these doors. When the other invoice is paid it will be from this fund. This fund is also used to help pay our mortgage. Each month \$6.9K is transferred to our general fund to help pay for the mortgage.


