## How Long, O Lord, Is this Interim Time?

It's common for congregations to wonder about the timeline for interim ministry, especially if the community hasn't had recent experience with it. Fun Fact: the past several pastors at Hope have been called without an interim time. This may mean some of you are feeling like the Israelites in the wilderness: Are we there yet? It never took this long before...

Ephesians 5 offers the Biblical answer to such a question: "It's a great mystery." Each pastoral transition has its own ingredients, and the ingredients determine the length of the interim. ULCH is presently in the "Transition Team" time, which requires 5 busy people to meet as often as possible (nearly every week) while also



engaging the congregation through forums, newsletters, coffee hours, emails, and other conversations. Across the times of meeting and engaging, this crew works out 12-16 pages of paperwork for the call process that will be handed off to the Vision and Governance Board and eventually sent to the synod office and used to match candidates with the congregation.

When the paperwork is nearly done, a Call Committee is assembled. We anticipate this happening in January. The bishop or the bishop's representative will schedule an open conversation with the congregation once the paperwork is completed. A few weeks after this visit, the call committee receives training for its work, and eventually a set of candidate names and resumes to review. Interviews happen next.

The formula for the length of interim ministry looks something like this: Take a look at your calendar (as a random starting point), multiply it by 5 or 6 similarly busy people's calendars, add a synod staff person's calendar, and divide it by the interim pastor's calendar and the cosine of the other congregation pastor's calendar, carry over the building schedule, minus all Sunday mornings and significant holy days, and you, too, can be part of the great mystery of interim ministry time.

Oh, and at Hope we also have construction projects in the mix. :)

But take heart, beloveds! The Holy Spirit is an unbelievable mathematician, and this equation will have a solution, and it will be one infused with the grace and goodness of God for the love of this congregation. A broad, general guesstimate for Hope is that the paperwork will be done by late February (meaning the Call Committee will be assembled this month) and the call process will be at full steam from that point until a candidate is identified. As we move through each step, the Epistle and Visitor will update you, and you are always welcome to ask me, should you like to know more. As you can tell, things change daily in this process but we forge on, trusting that we are beloved of God, beautifully made, fiercely loved, and gently held.




## Jim Wallis Book Study





## Future University Lutheran Church of Hope Member Meetings to Discuss our Land Acknowledgement and Beyond

The Racial Justice Team ("RJT") plans to hold three meetings in February 2025 to gather input from the University Lutheran Church of Hope (ULCH) congregation on our Land Acknowledgement ("LA") which will lead to a revised LA. Those meetings will be held during different times and days of the week to make it available for a wide variety of our members: Saturday afternoon on 2/1/25; after church on 2/2/25; and by Zoom in the evening on 2/6/25. The planned agenda for each meeting will be: (1) Intro on what we plan to do at the meeting; (2) History of our Land Acknowledgement in the ELCA and Hope; (3) Current LA language at ULCH; (4) Break into small groups for discussion; (5) Have each group share the thoughts from the groups.

The Racial Justice Team prays that you join us in this discussion on Land Acknowledgement and Beyond at one of the meetings.

### **Land Acknowledgement**

"We gather for worship on the land of our Creator. Many of us and our church building dwell in the traditional home of the Dakota people, and a land over which the Anishinaabeg people and others also moved. They gathered and ate food, rested, died and gave birth, and prayed here, and many still do."

## A Brief History of University Lutheran Church of Hope's Land Acknowledgement Process

"A land acknowledgment is only the beginning, the first few steps of a journey toward truth. But whether your congregation wants to begin its justice journey with Indigenous people or you want to practice personal acknowledgment in your community... this new Lutheran tradition of learning about and honoring the original inhabitants of the land where your church and homes now stand will be a mighty witness of your commitment to justice."

The Racial Justice Team, with the assistance of our Minister of Faith in Community at the time, drafted a Land Acknowledgement for University Lutheran Church of Hope pre-pandemic. The LA was then printed in the ULCH service bulletin for a couple of years. During the COVID lock-down, RJT decided that the bulletin acknowledgement was too easily overlooked, and did not help to change the narrative about the stolen land our church sits on or our need to make reparations to our Indigenous relations. Thus, with Pastor Jen Nagel's approval, RJT included the LA at the beginning of Hope's on-line services. When our services went live again, the presiding pastor read the LA after giving the Welcome.

RJT believed that it would show more public support of Racial Justice and Reparations by having different members read the LA aloud during the service. Pastor Jen presented this to Hope's Worship Planning Team in Oct. 2022 and reported to RJT that the Worship Team asked them to have someone ready to read the LA and that it be real and natural and not become rote. Thus, RJT began this practice with the LA.

To deepen the dialog about the Land Acknowledgement at Hope, RJT held three Adult Forums called "Toward a Land Acknowledgement & Beyond" in 2023 and 2024: Part 1: Why a Land Acknowledgement — Historical Background. Part II: Land Acknowledgements in S.E. Minneapolis. Part III: Hope's Land Acknowledgement & What Follows. RJT also held one-on-one conversations with approximately 25 members in various ministry areas of our congregation to obtain their input on our efforts regarding LA. The RJT hopes to further develop the LA and the congregation's reparations though the February 2025 Land Acknowledgement Congregational Meetings.

## January President's Report: Building Resiliency

How can a community develop **resiliency** – adapt to challenging circumstances, support the vulnerable, and prevail after a natural disaster or human-caused tragedy?

At the recent EcoFaith Summit, attended by many University Lutheran Church of Hope members, I heard Joshua Lewis of Minnesota Interfaith Power and Light speak about churches as a **Resiliency Hub**, a trusted place for a community to come together to access services, support, and resources. During a crisis, it can become a central location for volunteers, donations, coordination with emergency workers, and later, support for the community's recovery. <a href="https://www.mnipl.org/event/ccrn">https://www.mnipl.org/event/ccrn</a>)

Calvary and Holy Trinity, Lutheran congregations, faithfully demonstrated **resiliency** following the killing of George Floyd. Sabathani Community Center (310 E. 38<sup>th</sup> St. Mpls.) is creating a blueprint for promoting climate and racial justice *together*, in their Community Energy Project, "a transformative initiative aimed at creating a **resilient**, equitable, and sustainable [neighborhood], harnessing the power of community to address climate change, systemic inequalities, and poverty, simultaneously." Hope's young neighbors, far from their families and the support systems with which they were familiar, are particularly vulnerable during local crises. Hope is on our way to becoming a **Resiliency Hub** and we can broaden and deepen our capacities.

- Hope has experience supporting and sharing resources with ministry partners including Lutheran Campus Ministry, PEASE Academy, Portland House, and the neighboring congregations with whom we support immigrants. **Resilience** is grounded in a network of trusted, personal relationships.
- **Resilience** infrastructure depends on the capacity to generate and store power. Installation of our solar collectors is the beginning. Adding batteries would enable ULCH to store the excess power we produce and share it. If the local power grid goes down, Hope could offer our neighbors a hot meal, in a warm room, with a place to re-charge their vehicles and devices.
- Hospitality is woven into the fabric of resilience. Hope has folks with the know-how, and the facilities, to cook and bake for large numbers of people. Enhancing Hope's presence on social media and a reimagined ULCH website could announce our presence in the neighborhood and lift-up the gifts we have to share.

How is Hope uniquely positioned to serve as a **Resiliency Hub** in our neighborhood, accompanying our neighbors in their everyday trials, as well as in times of crisis?

We know who and whose we are - the author of **resilience.** "Fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness... If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit." (Galatians 5:22, 25)

General Giving is less than budget for November. As I've previously mentioned General Giving can be difficult to budget but we know our members give generously and continue to keep our church running with funds to thrive. What continues to be a blessing for us is our relationship with PEASE and, of late, our parkers. Frankly I don't like all the construction but it is good our parking lot can be used for the construction workers. Year-to-date our Total Income is better than budget by over \$53K. Thank you members.

Salary and Benefits are slightly under budget this month but will balance out once the final details of onboarding new staff come through the system.

Overall each department is managing their expenses well. However this month Administration paid a few annual fees for software causing the overall department to be over budget by \$2.1K. Operations was under budget this month by \$4.4K. Because we have an older building we budget for Exterior Repairs. In November we did not have any expenses. Also we double paid our insurance in October so we had no insurance expense in November.

As of November 30 our Net Income is better than budet by \$58.5K.

Our Building Fund has cash of \$154K as of 11.30.2024. In November the Building Fund reimbursed the Operating Account in the amount of \$32,222. This payment was for the Sidewalk Replacement, Update to AC units, Sanctuary door supplies for installing our pretty new doors, costs related to the paino repair and the courtyard landscaping. It's wonderful that we have the means to cover these expenses that help improve and maintain our building.
